Whew! Am I glad that's over... Well for the most part it is. The 2011 growing season I mean.

Recalling the weeks leading up to the 2011 planting, remember how optimistic we all were about what 2011 would hold for us? The fall of 2010 started out wet with all that rainfall coming just prior to harvest. Many fields were under water and we worried about the harvest. Then it turned almost perfect and harvest was completed without many problems. Winter provided us with above average amounts of snowfall so going into planting, we had adequate soil moisture.

Then April came with cold and wet conditions and May followed with much the same. Planting was delayed and in some cases, areas of fields were not planted at all. I don't recall a spring where we had such a challenge getting everything planted. As the eternal optimists we all are, we knew that the crop would begin to pull out of its slow start and as we headed into the later part of June, the crop really responded.

Now we all know the rest of the story, and at times during the growing season, I felt as if we were back in biblical times with plagues hitting us one after another. Devastating winds, dry weather, disease outbreaks and the clincher, a frost so early that most of the soybeans were impacted. It was almost enough to roll over and have the referee slap the mat and yell "Your Pinned" But again, you know the rest of the story and the fall turned terrific for harvest and we harvested a good, albeit smaller then we wanted, crop after all!

So what can we learn from this years crop?

The first thing that I would say is that there are few good learning's from this years' crop. It is hard to compare hybrids without adding an asterisk beside with comments stating that the area was flooded, or it was planted in wet mucky soil, or that the frost reduced the yield by 7-9 bushels.

What I can tell you is that...

<u>Risk Management</u> is the first and foremost tool that you need to continue to sharpen in the coming years. With the volatility of crop prices, and the unpredictability of the weather, protecting yourself is the best learning you can take away from 2011.

<u>Be Innovative</u> is something that you can also do. Agriculture is constantly changing and new products and management techniques are coming faster to the forefront then ever before. Seek out these new and innovative ideas and trial them on your farm. Some may work while others may not. The only way that you will know for certain is if you have an on-the-farm experience, on your farm.

<u>Being Flexible</u> with your plans is another great learning we can take from 2011. The weather is very unpredictable which can lead to headaches for all who work to put in a crop. This will be especially true for this spring when trying to get all of the nitrogen applied!
