





STEVE'S CORNER

LATE SEASON FROST DAMAGE

Soybeans:

Low temperatures and wide-spread frost occurred on the morning of September 15th that affected the soybean crop in our area. Damage to the soybean plant is dependent on the stage that the plant was in, as well as the duration of time that frost was present. The majority of the soybeans in our area were in the R6 stage (green seed fills the pod cavity on the top nodes of the stem). It appears that the damage occurred mostly on the upper leaves of the plant. Most of the lower leaves along with the majority of the stems survived. Photosynthesis has been reduced making it hard for the upper pods to completely fill out and mature normally. As a result of the frost, we may experience green stems and/or pods making the harvest of them a bit more challenging. Time will tell, but we do not believe that it will be as severe as we originally thought.

Corn:

Before the frost, we were seeing many of the corn fields in our area with plants that were yellow on the top and bottom and green in the middle due to the dry conditions causing the plants to mature faster than normal. These conditions were beneficial when we received a pre-mature frost. Most of the corn in our area was about ½ milk line or very near black layer at the time of the frost, resulting in very little damage. The later planted corn, due to the late spring may have been effected and we could experience lighter test weights as well as corn that might be a bit more stubborn when it comes to dry down.

The corn crop has been under tremendous stress from the start of the year. We need to keep an eye on these fields to determine which fields should be harvested first.



← Notice that the top leaves are dead while the bottom leaves and stems are still fully healthy. Again, this will result in a delayed photosynthesis, but should not be much of a drag on your final yield!

COVERAGE CORNER



I would like to touch on a few key points that are happening in the Crop Insurance world right now. As many of you know, the 2008 Farm Bill is coming up on its renewal. Some of the biggest cuts that have been proposed are coming from Crop Insurance. What this means is that the subsidy that is included in your Crop Insurance premiums is going to be reduced, resulting in higher premiums to you, the grower. I encourage you to get involved to help support the cause. I would love to see the government continue to support the the farming community, but I am fairly confident that the proposed cuts towards Crop Insurance are not the way to go.

With that said, it is important to keep an eye on your fields prior to harvest to get a jump on any of your units that might need a claim. With the frost that we experienced on September 15th, we were encouraged to place claims on the majority of the fields insured.
